Paraphrasing is such a difficult skill for your masters - and it is very important! Paraphrasing writing is required for many types. Children who do not learn to express well not only turn into poor writers, but can also apply for plagiarism, which is not a good thing at all. Here is a step plan for teaching your students paraphrasing. Start with Talking By at its core, putting something into their words paraphrasing, so the student starts just by doing it. A fun promotional event, dividing your students into couples and what did you do after school yesterday? or ask a question like tell me where you want to go on vacation and why you want to go there. Student A answers the question in three or four sentences. Next, Student B expresses the student's answers. Later, partners change roles. You'll want to model it once or twice for the class before you start. Another game you can play with your students is Quiz, Quiz, a variation on trading. Give each student a card with a sentence written on it. Have the students find partners. Student reads sentence A, and Student B means it. Then, students change roles. Finally, both trade cards before moving to find different partners. Paraphrase Together Try paragraphing a short paragraph together as a class. View the paragraph with your document camera or dashboard. You may want to give your students their own copies. Make sure your students know the difference between paraphrasing and summarizing. Talk about the different strategies that can be used. An approach to Four R's: Reword - Change synonyms and phrases when you can. Rearrange – Rearrange words in sentences to make new sentences. You can even rearrange the ideas presented in the paragraph. Notice that some words and phrases cannot be changed – names, dates, titles, etc. cannot be changed, but you can express them differently. Re-Check – Make sure your Paraphrase means the same as the original text. Independent App After you've done a few together, try your students working in pairs to interpret a paragraph on the board. Be sure to let several couples share with the paraphrases class. At this point, students can start working independently. You may want to stay with a paragraph at the same time, as it will be less overwhelming than the entire article. Eventually you will want to go paraphrasing all the articles, Pulling All Together. Encourage students to interpret it in bite-sized pieces, one paragraph at a time. As your students become fluent paraphrasers, you can move them to more advanced activities, such as: from the text itself, rather than paraphrasing from notes from the original text. your paraphrased posts including quotes. paraphrasing some sections and summarizes other sections. including paraphrasing, summarizing and all nails in one piece. use multiple resources to interpret, summarize, and add citations.
